

MY FLESH, MY BLOOD / Moja Krev

Igor is a lonely, professional boxer whose world comes to a halt when he learns that his brain has been severely damaged. Refusing to undergo surgery, he knows that his days are numbered. His last desire is to leave a child behind as his legacy. A young Vietnamese immigrant, Yen Ha, agrees to have his baby in return for Polish citizenship. Despite the nature of their agreement, they slowly fall in love, but then Igor's health deteriorates...

LITTLE MOSCOW / Mała Moskwa

17 March / 7pm / Campus Cinema Poland 2008 113', Dir. Waldemar Krzystek

It's 1967. Jura, a Russian pilot is transferred to Legnica, the biggest soviet garrison in Eastern

Europe. Here, his wife, Wiera meets a Polish officer Michał, who shares her love for music. At first she denies a sense of awakening, but soon she gives in. It's already 1968; war rules are in place... This movie takes us to the world where in one city, separated by walls and prohibitions, Russians and Poles lived together and despite fear and common invigilation loved, suffered and had their dreams.

HAUNTING JAZZ SCORES

Join us for the night with works of director Roman Polański and the phenomenal composer and jazz pianist Krzysztof Komeda,

one of the most important artists in the history of Polish Jazz.

The Oscar-nominated Knife In The Water (1963 / 94' / 6pm) is a subtly chilling tale about a married couple who pick up a young hitchhiker to join them on a boating trip, which provides a background for an agonizingly tense look at male posturing and ego.

ary's Baby (1968/136'/8.15pm/introduction by Prof. Stephe of University of Exeter) the mix of Polański's ordinary settings and Komeda's score of jazz, 60's pop and unique gothic orchestra lead to a truly disturbing effect, in this low key thriller with a shocking twist. Komeda's powerful and chilling theme, The Lullaby, is one of the most memorable of all horror film themes.



29 April / 6pm / Exeter Central Library, Meeting Room, free admission Poland 1961 103', Dir. Jerzy Kawalerowicz

One of the landmarks of Polish cinema, this film is based on the documented story of the 'possession' of a group of nuns that led to the burning of a priest at the stake in Loudun, France in 1634. Mother Joan of the Angels is a visually rigorous and profoundly disturbing exploration of faith, repression, fanaticism and eros.

5 May / 8.15pm / Main Auditorium, Exeter Phoenix Poland 1974 139', Dir. Andrzej Wajda

Based on the novel by Nobel-winner Władysław Reymont, this is a monumental, rich epic of the sweeping changes in values and material life brought on by Poland's late industrial revolution. The Oscar nominated movie follows three young friends, a Pole, a Jew and a German, who pool their money together to build a factory, and their ruthless pursuit of

7 May / 7pm / Campus Cinema Poland 1983 120', Dir. Juliusz Machulski

A couple of scientists decide to freeze themselves for three years. The outbreak of World War III ensues that the men remain under for 50 years,

and are revived into a totalitarian post-apocalyptic world in which they are the only male inhabitants. Facing harsh treatment from their female guards, they will do everything to save themselves and to re-establish the male population.

12 May / 6pm / Main Auditorium, Exeter Phoenix Poland 2007 104', Dir. Dorota Kedzierzawska

Danuta Szaflarska (92 year old) stars as Aniela in this gentle black-andwhite character study of the daily happenings of a sprightly non-agenarian woman as she experiences the final act of her life. As much a relic of the past as the big dacha-style house in which she lives, Aniela runs into conflict with a nasty neighbour, who sees her property as an eyesore and wants to do everything in his reach to buy it up and tear it down.

12 May / 8.15pm / Main Auditorium, Exeter Phoenix Poland 2009 99', Dir. Borys Lankosz

This darkly humorous suspense story, set against the backdrop of communist Poland in the 1950s, tells the tale of Sabina, a 30-year-old woman living with her mother and grandmother, who is struggling to find a husband in down-at-heel Warsaw.

But when a dapper young chap finally does win Sabina's heart, the family finds they've got more than they'd bargained for.

14 May / 7pm / Campus Cinema, University of Exeter Poland 1999 107', Dir. Krzysztof Krauze

Forget special effects. Forget the run-of-the mill Hollywood films made and remade hundred times. See 'The Debt' instead. Based on true events, this gripping psychological thriller tells the story of fear, hope and desperation of two entrepreneurs who become enmeshed in the criminal web of a Russian thug. Paralyzed with fear, they decide on a plan to free themselves from this sadistic blackmail. The rest makes itself. And what you get is mind-numbing.
